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

FROM THE DIRECTORS

Dear Friends,

God's care for the most vulnerable is a common theme throughout all of scripture. I believe that God's people, being adopted into His family and taking on His very nature, should be the ones most capable of helping those in need. This calling compelled the founders of Cookson Hills 62 years ago, and it continues to drive us today. That is why we provide home, school, and therapy for kids who are at-risk.

Throughout my time as Executive Director, my main focus has been ensuring the ministry is able to continue providing home, school, and therapy for the next 50+ years. Over this past year, we made significant progress. Here are the key results from last year's annual goals:

Review of 2019

Goal: Finish Building Project Construction

Result: This 10 year-project is complete! We obtained occupancy permits on the last 3 houses, finally! This labor of love provides housing, in a Christian-family setting, for the kids in our care.

Goal: Establish sustainable and clean water source

Result: We have successfully connected to the Southern Delaware Water Authority! Moving this water source ensures clean water for the ministry indefinitely. Additionally, this will minimize our need to manage an entire water system internally.

Goal: Develop campus-wide Footprint Project

Result: The project has been developed and the Board approved removing 18 unnecessary buildings, relocating

6 staff houses out of a floodplain, repurposing 40 acres of land, and replacing the outdated water infrastructure. The implementation of this project will eliminate the waste of \$50,000 and 5,000 man hours per year.

Another accomplishment of 2019 was the successful restart of our Music Program at Cookson Hills Christian School. The students were thankful and excited to have the opportunity to express themselves through music. Over 65% of our student body participated in at least one music class this year. The students were proud to showcase their accomplishments for many of our supporters during Hilltop in June of 2019.

Same Vision - New Leader

This fall, we are completing the transition of the Executive Director role to Ron Riley. Our leadership approached the transition with humility and willingness, keeping our vision set on the big picture of doing what is best for the ministry. Ron is a capable and Godly man; I trust you will find him as such. Coming up next, Ron will give you an overview of his story and the ministry goals for 2020. I ask you to pray for Ron and the Leadership Team. Leading Cookson Hills is both fulfilling and fraught with challenges that will push a leader beyond their normal boundaries.

Looking back on my time leading Cookson Hills, I am grateful. I am grateful for the people I served alongside, for the challenges that made me wiser, and that a place like Cookson Hills exists to serve those in need. I am grateful that God used me to steward His vineyard.

Dear Friends & Supporters of Cookson Hills,

My wife, Donna, and I entered the world of adoption and foster care over twenty years ago. We were motivated by the loss of two of our own children to genetic disorders. Our desire was to bring hope to the lives of children, providing them a home and parents who would love them unconditionally. Our family grew from three to eight with numerous foster children coming in and out along the way.

We would never change the way our family came to us or the opportunity to share our home with numerous children. However, it is hard to overstate the amount of dysfunction within the world of child care services. Our hearts were broken more than once for a child caught in a system that seemed set up for failure.

At Cookson Hills, I have been blessed to see a different form of child care service. Having dealt with the foster care and adoption processes in three different states, I know the system of foster care and where it fails—and I know that Cookson Hills offers a much better opportunity for kids. That difference is what brought me to this ministry. With joy and anticipation, I look forward to this new season ahead of leading Cookson Hills.

Looking Forward

We have entered year 2 of our 5-year strategic plan. This plan will continue to provide a unified vision for the ministry during our time of leadership transition.

Our goals this year will focus on 3 areas of the strategic plan; enhancing programs, strengthening finances, and increasing employee tenure. As we journey into 2020 our 4 primary goals will be as follows:

- Reach enrollment benchmark to operate within 85% capacity of 80 kids
- Students participate in 1,000 hours of relaunched equine facilitated programs
- Complete phase 2 of the Footprint Project
- Invest in staff by raising an additional \$100,000




Grow closer as a family

46 kids served at Cookson Hills

Last year, we announced that we were eliminating our short-term track. We did this because our data showed that we need at least 2 years with a child to bear lasting fruit. This change meant that for 2019, the number of kids served was less than previous years. However, all new data is showing that we are making great strides towards providing kids with long-term care! This year alone, we saw increases in the percentage of kids present the whole year, average length of stay, and percent of kids dismissed after completing at least 2 years of care! This data is encouraging as it affirms that we are moving towards our goal. Long-term care provides stability and long lasting results for our kids, as well as higher houseparent tenure for the ministry.

Acquire skills for lifelong learning


Students receive an education that is focused on helping them grow academically, spiritually, and socially in a trauma-informed environment. Small class sizes ensure each student is getting the personalized instruction he or she needs.





RESTARTING MUSIC PROGRAM CLASSES

God has greatly impacted the hearts and minds of our students through their participation in musical classes, performances, and competitions. This impact has been shown by improvements in our students' social skills, stress reduction, and positive ways of coping with frustration and trauma. With regard to musical training, 4 out of 7 students in Percussion Ensemble were unable to read music at the start of the year. But during a springtime Solo and Ensemble Festival, our students earned a superior rating for their performance! Thank you for your help in bringing this vocal and instrumental program back to our school!




LIFE SKILLS CLASS MADE YEAR ROUND






EQUINE COMING BACK

Last year, we announced that we had paused our equine program while we evaluated effectiveness. Our goal was to restart the program within two years. Pieces fell into place quicker than we imagined, and thanks to our incredible supporters, we were able to bring on an equine specialist this past June! We now offer horsemanship classes that help students build a relationship with their horse, learn how to build healthy human relationships, and gain a deeper understanding of God's love. RELOCATED

This move reallocated 450 man hours- allowing staff and volunteers to serve in more effective ways. It also allowed students more time in the classroom- recovering 10 class periods in a year!

Executive Director

Pairing this with his familiarity of foster care and adoption, developing servant leaders, and his Masters of Arts in Organizational Leadership- he is uniquely suited and well-equipped to lead this ministry.

Kerry will lead the "Home" component of our program, directing houseparents, social workers, enrollment, and child welfare. Most recently, she worked as a Child Welfare Specialist for Oklahoma Department of Human Services and brings very valuable experience to our ministry!



Reach enrollment benchmark to operate within 85% capacity of 80 kids

In 2018 we eliminated the short-term track from our program. Even with this change, some students are still here for shorter periods. For example, if a mother regains stability, she may choose to take her 3 children home after a 5-month stay. Therefore, enrollment numbers are always fluctuating, and while we served 46 kids this year, those 46 kids were not all here at the same time. Our five-year goal is to serve within 85% capacity of 80 kids, at any given time. However, we need time to enroll this many kids and build the proper team to serve them. Therefore, our benchmark goal for 2020 is to operate at 50% capacity, serving 40 kids at any given time.



Students participate in 1,000 hours of relaunched equine facilitated programs

The benefits of equine facilitated programs seem to be endless. They help kids develop physical strength, self-awareness, trust, confidence, communication skills, and tools for working through anxiety. Some students are excited for this opportunity while others are fearful of working with such a large animal. Our goal is to encourage and empower students to collectively complete 1,000 hours of equine facilitated programs.



Complete phase 2 of the Footprint Project

During this phase of the project, we will be relocating 6 homes out of a floodplain, removing 6 unnecessary buildings, and replacing outdated water infrastructure. The implementation of this project will allow us to better steward the resources God has entrusted to our care, as it will eliminate the waste of \$50,000 and 5,000 man hours annually.



Invest in staff by raising an additional \$100,000

One of the most effective ways we can continue to help the kids we serve is to make sure we have the best possible team. Our goal over this next year is to invest an additional \$100,000 in salaries and retirement program incentives. These increases in salaries and retirement benefits allow us to invest and better care for our staff while also improving staff retention. Ultimately, we want to be a place where you can live out your life's calling and enjoy a vibrant community, all while supporting yourself and a family.
